This curriculum booklet will give you information about what we are learning in this part of the term for each subject. Under each subject the objectives will be written for what is being taught.

In Reading, Writing and Maths some objectives will be covered over more than one session.

Writing:

The objectives to be covered:

To learn and use new words to describe different emotions such as happiness, sadness, anger, friendship and inspiration. To understand how word choice helps express feelings in writing and discussion.

To recognise different sentence types including statements, questions, commands and exclamations.

To join ideas using conjunctions (and, but, or) to form compound sentences.

To continue to apply phonic knowledge and skills to read words accurately.

To read aloud books that match my phonics ability, sounding out unfamiliar words.

To listen to, discuss and express views about stories, poems and non-fiction texts.

To discuss the sequence of events in books and how information is organised.

To recognise and talk about different styles and features of texts (e.g. stories, poems, information).

To make predictions about what might happen next in a story. To answer and ask questions about what I have read or listened to

To infer how characters are feeling and why they act as they do. To make links between books I read and my own experiences.

To recognise and explain how vocabulary choices create meaning and impact.

To add and subtract numbers using concrete objects, pictures, and mental methods.

To identify and name everyday materials and the objects made from them.

To describe the simple properties of everyday materials using appropriate vocabulary.

To compare materials and describe which are suitable or unsuitable for specific uses.

To explain why different materials are chosen for particular purposes.

To test and observe how materials can change shape when squashed, bent, twisted or stretched.

To investigate which materials are absorbent or waterproof and explain their uses.

To explore how the shapes and properties of solid objects can change depending on how they are used.

To identify natural and man-made materials and consider how using them can help or harm the planet.

To carry out simple tests, make observations, record results and use evidence to answer questions.

Phonics

Phonics is a way of teaching children how to read and write. It helps children hear, identify and use different sounds that distinguish one word from another in the English language. Written language can be compared to a code, so knowing the sounds of individual letters and how those letters sound when they're combined will help children decode words as they read.

In Phase 5 Sounds, new digraphs and split diagraphs are taught alongside reinforcing and reviewing Phases 2, 3 and 4 Sounds. Phase 5 is taught in Term One of Year 2, it continues on from Year 1. Pupils will learn alternative pronunciations for familiar digraphs. Some pupils may need additional phonics instruction throughout Year Two to secure their understanding.
